Tell Us How You Want to Play

In conjunction with "I Heart Madisonville Day" (04/10), Madisonville will kick off a robust planning process at Bramble Park at 11AM. In the past year, Bramble Park received upgrades to the upper shelter, enhancement to the Little Duck Creek Trail, installation of additional electrical access and will soon receive a new Spinami (see picture). With your feedback and creative ideas, Bramble Park looks to include more options in the coming year.



"We want Bramble Park to be a destination for not only those in our community, but those wishing to visit Madisonville," MCC President Kate Botos said. "We look to create a park that is equitable and accessible, a park connected to trails and bikeways and a park that promote healthy living for all ages."

The Bramble Park Master Plan will be the city's "how to" guide on providing access to parks and recreational activities to the neighborhood. The Cincinnati Recreation Commission and the Cincinnati Park Board are dedicated to providing recreational and cultural activities for all people in our neighborhoods and the whole community. The parks planning process will draw from the goals and strategies of Plan Cincinnati: **COMPETE, CONNECT, LIVE, SUSTAIN, and COLLABORATE.**

Creating the Bramble Park Master Plan gives the neighborhood the opportunity to weigh in on all the potential amenities that will help our park to thrive. The City of Cincinnati received grant funds in the amount of \$75,000 from the State of Ohio to be used toward the inclusion of a nature playscape at Bramble Park (on site location to be determined.)

"We are in a unique position to capitalize on the placement of the Little Duck Creek Trail and the connection on the Murray Bike Path," Executive Director of MCURC Elishia Chamberlain said. "Creating a thoughtful design will draw residents to spend afternoons exploring different elements of the park."

Final implementation costs of the Bramble Park Master Plan will be determined by the data gathered from community engagement activities. In the coming weeks, be on the lookout for opportunities to share your ideas, imagery, and suggested amenities. All are welcome to take part in our Master Park Plan! Join us on April 10th for the kickoff!



Neighborhood Traffic Updates

Completed/Implemented Projects (Blue)

MCC and MCURC have been hard at work ensuring we see continued improvements to our streets through traffic calming measures as well as bike and pedestrian improvements. The maps below show the recently completed projects as well as those requested. This does not include the many streetscape improvements made at the Madison and Whetsel intersection which have been part of the overall development. Also not included are the intersections that will benefit from the Paint the Streets program, the artistic bike rack installations that are being addressed in the public arts planning process.

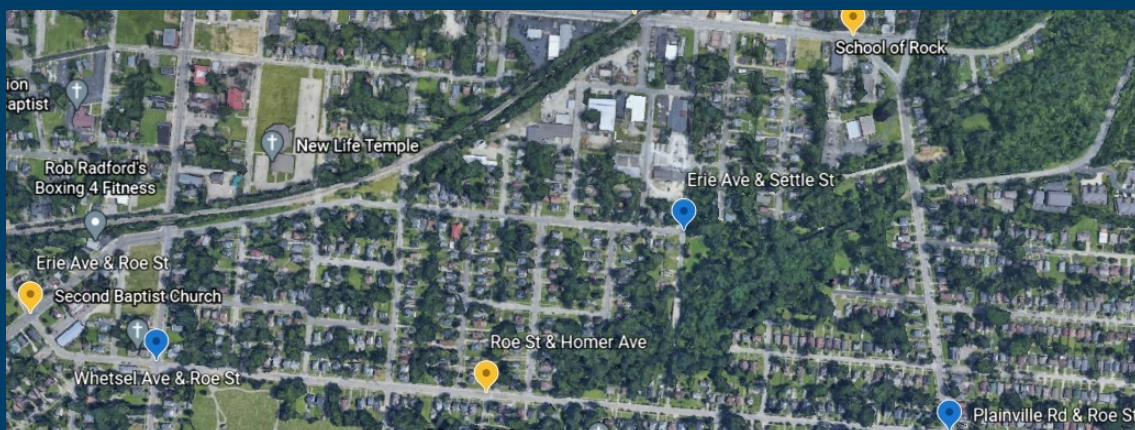
WHETSEL AVE & ROE ST

PLAINVILLE RD & ROE ST

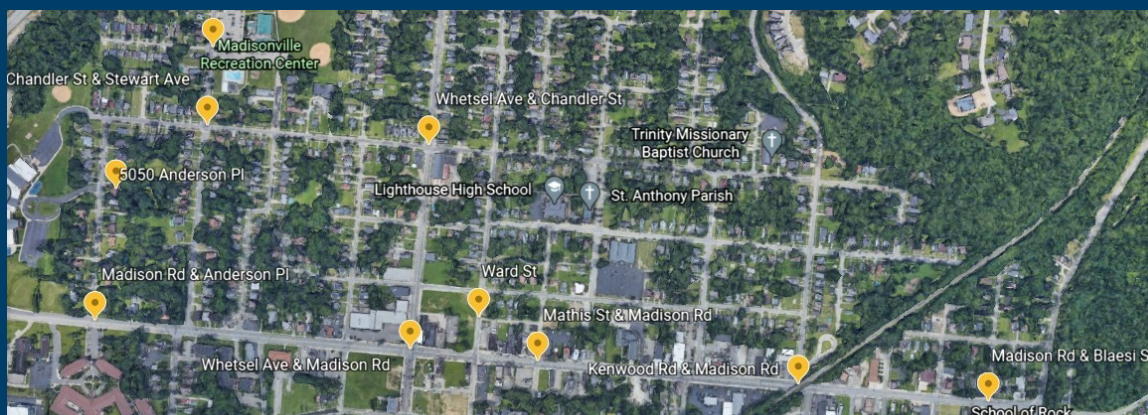
A request has been made to make this intersection a 4 way stop, put in crosswalks and for an evaluation to be conducted on driver visibility.

Interview with Sabori Bhattacharya

Can you describe your business? We are a health management store that caters to pain, stress, sleep and anxiety issues with plans to expand to mental health care and acupuncture.

What made you choose this type of business? I am trained as a psychiatrist and felt that psychiatric medications do not always need to be a first resort.

What inspired you to start your own business? I have a million ideas and felt the best way to give test them out is to try them out in a setting where I have the freedom to experiment.

What is your background and how did you develop the skills to start your business? I attended medical school and residency here in Cincinnati and am still developing the skills needed to start and run Balance Health! Medicine teaches you to multitask and break things down to minutiae, so that has definitely helped me a lot through this process.

What has been your biggest challenge? Starting out during a pandemic has been a bit of a challenge. We had temporarily opened downtown while our Madisonville location was under construction, but had to close down during the pandemic. We ended up losing a lot of time-sensitive products during our closure and eventual reopening in Madisonville one year later.

To what do you attribute your success? I suppose you can call opening a new business in the midst of a pandemic a personal success, regardless of how many people actually cross your business's threshold. Thus I would say that perseverance and hope, not to mention a supportive and patient family, is what got me this far.

Which small businesses are you inspired by? Women-owned businesses inspire me because these owners often have to juggle family, work-life balance, and funding without a huge safety net.

How do you juggle multiple responsibilities? I keep my stress down by using many of the products I carry in the store! I find I can manage things if I can stay calm and focused.

What sets you apart from everyone else? I use science to back up my product selection. Plus, I hope everyone who walks out Balance's door will have learned a little something about their health and wellness.

What's the nicest thing a customer has ever said to you about your products/service? We recently had a customer come in who suffered from sleep issues for over 30 years. 5G Cell Towers Come to Cincinnati

Verizon is placing 5G Small Cell Towers (40' wooden poles) at 30 locations in West Price Hill. This is just a start and will be occurring throughout the City of Cincinnati. Permits are currently being issued in batches of 30. Federal and State law prevents municipalities from prohibiting telecommunication equipment from being placed in the Right of Way (ROW).

Residents affected can expect to receive a card from Verizon notifying them of the placement of a tower in the ROW (pictured below).

Cincinnati Department of Transportation and Engineering is using the FYI memo penned by then City Manager Patrick Duhaney back in 2019 to do a blanket approval on these permits (*to view related documents click [here](#)*). Due to the nature of 5G, these poles will eventually be everywhere as they only have a 1,000' range, whereas 4G has a 50,000' range. Several Community Councils (including Madisonville) are currently working to push legislation that will require 5G tower regulation as more 5G towers mean an increase to electric and magnetic fields (EMFs) radiation exposure.

Please allow this letter to serve as notice that Verizon has applied to the City of Cincinnati to place wireless equipment within the right-of-way in your neighborhood.

Councilman Steve Goodin has drafted the following motion:

The spread of 5G mobile communications technology has necessitated the deployment of thousands of small cell system towers throughout the United States. Such towers are now being deployed in Cincinnati neighborhoods. While state and federal law pre-empts municipal-level efforts to ban the towers outright, some communities have been able to regulate the towers' placement through uniform zoning code regulations, including notice to surrounding property owners. Such regulations are necessary due to the aesthetic impact of these towers, and their potential deterrence of future development activities. Accordingly, WE MOVE that the Administration advise Council regarding all potential methods of regulating 5G small cell system towers under the City's Municipal Code, Administrative Code and Zoning Code.

The motion passed the Education, Innovation, and Growth Committee after West Price Hill Community Council and community members spoke regarding the issue. This will move to the City Council in the coming weeks. While Mayor John Cranley supported the motion, there has been no confirmation yet if DOTE will put a pause on all new permits until text can be added to the Zoning code to deal with the issue. The Madisonville Community Council will keep the neighborhood updated as more information becomes available.

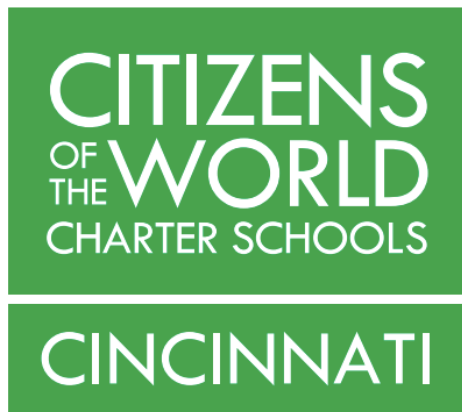


Mockup of a proposed tower in West Price Hill

Much like everyone else, many of our projects we have been working to deliver were stalled during the pandemic. Much of what we do requires cooperation from the City as well as other partnering agencies, and with all partners also being hindered with the obstacles the pandemic presented, we had some backlogs on our work. Many of these projects we had been sharing with you are finally under way. MCURC staff continued to work diligently on project delivery, and MCURC Board worked to adopt the new strategic plan that will guide our activity over the next several years. This list highlights projects and programs that had been delayed due to COVID-19, and is not an exhaustive list of our activity.

- We have been working to plan events that will support our business district, kicking off with the March 28th Art Walk.
- During I Heart Madisonville Day we will be working to deliver welcome bags to our renters at our three new developments that will contain information for community engagement, and have some Madisonville swag.
- Parks Planning for the Bramble Park Master Plan will be on I Heart Madisonville Day, and we will be working with MCC and CRC on this effort to create the vision that will guide our efforts as we work to build on the success that is Bramble Park.
- MCURC has been partnering with the Port Authority to assess the Model Laundry site (Whetsel Ave) which will give us the information needed to generate a remediation plan.
- The redevelopment of 6012 Madison is moving forward, and we plan to see a new business—with new jobs, opening next Spring.
- We continue to offer support to the Madison and Whetsel project through communications assistance and serving on the Design Review Committee. Phase II is scheduled for completion later this year, and Phase III is now underway with scheduled completion in summer 2022.
- The NOFA homes are finally gaining traction once again, and we hope to see the majority of these homes completed for sale by end of year.
- Madisonville Diaries will have the first video released by April 1. These videos are a way for us to highlight the stories of our legacy residents as they share why Madisonville is special to them.

High Percentage of Older People are Killed by Autos

Says Traffic Safety Council

A frightfully high percentage of the pedestrians killed by automobiles in Cincinnati are older people the Traffic Safety Council says. If you are such a person the Council urges you to show unusual care when you cross the street in view of the fact that during 1938 there were 19 persons over 64 years of age killed by automobiles in this city—14 of which were pedestrians.

The reasons for this excessive killing of old people as listed by the Traffic Safety Council are as follows:

1. Old people are far less alert while crossing streets than those who are younger.
2. Old people, when hurt, are far more likely to receive serious or fatal injuries than younger men and women.
3. Old people usually have never had the experience of driving a car and therefore do not appreciate the difficulties in stopping and swerving when a pedestrian suddenly darts out in the street.
4. Older people have not received safety education in their formative years of their lives.

It is needless to say that broken bones do not mend easily in later life and that complications are far more likely to cause fatal results. Therefore, since it is a fact that Cincinnati is having a large percentage of its traffic fatalities among old persons the Safety Council urges greater care with each added year of life.
